

Maud Moon Weyerhaeuser Sanborn (1876-1965) was born in Rochester, Minnesota. She married Charles Weyerhaeuser in 1898 and lived most of her life in Saint Paul. A talented singer always active in the musical community, she supported Schubert Club and the Minneapolis Symphony. She had a special affection for Salzburg and Tanglewood where she spent summers. She developed close friendships with important musicians of

her day such as Dmitri Mitropoulos and Serge Koussevitsky. The International Artist Series is dedicated to her memory by her grandchildren.

A Note from Roderick Williams

Recently I have been exploring a way of programming recitals that is inspired by the idea of a related playlist as opposed to offering blocks of complete song sets or cycles. In this playlist model, a lead song suggests a further short group linked by theme, although the link could just as easily be one of direct contrast rather than sympathy. The link can be poetic or musical; it is an opportunity for free mind association.

Libby and I discussed how it might work for her to write several short songs interspersed throughout the programme rather than her music appearing in one group. We came to think of it as resembling an infant's suspended mobile. The central theme of the haiku Libby has chosen is one of displacement; from this central image hang threads that take the programme in different but connected directions. I have then attached songs from my repertoire to these threads and thus the programme takes its shape. It may well be that the result will create connections in the mind of the listener to further songs, poetry and images which will allow the fragile to grow ever onwards in suspension.

A Note from Libby Larsen

I have been extraordinarily fortunate to live in the Twin Cities and to have had a relationship with the Schubert Club since high school, when I first started attending concerts. Over the course of my work as an independent composer, I've been honored to have been commissioned by the Schubert Club to compose works for the late Benita Valente (*ME, Brenda Ueland*, 1987), Kimberly Barber (*Raspberry Island Dreaming*, 2002) Bridget Kibbey and Alexi Kenney (*Sun Strider*, 2022) and Roderick Williams (*Mobile/Not Mobile/...*, 2025). Grateful seems too contained a word for the Schubert Club's 140+years of unwavering support of the work of Composers, including myself, and the place of Composers in society.

This new piece is a collaboration. There are many ways we build programs. The most common is the narrative arc from birth to death with love and loss. But we're living in a world where a particular linear narrative is not necessarily the most relevant way to connect to the world at this point in time.

I presented to Roderick an idea that had been brewing in my head since 2001. I had discovered a volume called May Skies, There's Always a Tomorrow, an anthology of haiku in the World War II internment camps for Japanese American citizens. This particular book had over 130 haiku that were written by interned Japanese human beings reflecting their moments as they were interned. I suggested that we look through the book and consider how that might generate a concert: it will just be a mobile, like an Alexander Calder mobile. Anchored to a central rod with a delicate balance of wires from which are hung plates. They float in space in no particular order. And what if the haiku were the plates of the mobile? They don't suggest any kind of narrative; they suggest floating in infinite time, which is an experience you have when you are imprisoned. I think we all know now what that feels like because of the pandemic, we all lost a sense of beginning and end: Couldn't feel the beginning, couldn't sense an ending. That's haiku form in our culture. For Mobile/NotMobile/... the idea of haiku creates a frame for a mobile. This mobile frames the entire evening. Each haiku is a suspended element of the mobile. Each haiku's text inspired Roderick and lain to create a group of well-known art songs to be sung directly following that haiku. Though within individual songs you may experience familiar narrative arcs along with feelings of completeness, our haiku mobile aims more for singular moments of non-narrative contemplation, touching upon the abstract, essential emotions of human experience.

In some of the songs, I present the haiku almost in kind of a chant-like way, without applying a meter. And that melds into the realization of the English music, but they all form a whole. They're tiny little songs. The longest of these is two minutes. The shortest is 40 seconds. It's really a balancing. of a very distilled tradition in haiku, multi-layered layers that none of us can understand. In tiny, airy poetic presentation, balancing that with the Western concert tradition is where the fun is. I have had a great deal of fun and excitement in trying to understand how the Western concert tradition works with haiku and how haiku works with the Western concert tradition.

Roderick Williams

Roderick Williams is one of the UK's most sought-after baritones and is constantly in demand on the concert platform and in recital

© Theo Williams and in recital, encompassing repertoire from the baroque to world premieres.

Opera engagements have included major roles at leading opera houses worldwide including the Royal Opera House Covent Garden, English National Opera, Dutch National Opera, Dallas Opera, the Bregenz Festival and Oper Köln. He has been involved in many world premieres including Alexander Knaifel's *Alice in Wonderland*, several operas by Michel van der Aa, the title role in Robert Saxton's *The Wandering Jew*, and the UK premiere of Sally Beamish's *Judas Passion* with the Orchestra of the Age of the Enlightenment.

Notable operatic engagements have included Oronte in Charpentier's Medée, Toby Kramer in van der Aa's Sunken Garden, Don Alfonso / Cosi fan Tutte and Sharpless / Madam Butterfly and baritone in a staging of Britten's War Requiem for English National Opera, the title role in Eugene Onegin for Garsington Opera, the title role in Billy Budd for Opera North, van der Aa's After Life at Melbourne State Theatre and at Opera de Lyon, and van de Aa's Upload for Dutch National Opera, the Bregenz Festival, Oper Köln and at the Park Avenue Armory in New York. He has also appeared as Papageno and as Ulisse / Il Ritorno di Ulisse in Patria for the Royal Opera House, Toby Kramer for Dallas Opera, and Christus / St John Passion in staged performances with the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra and the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, both under Sir Simon Rattle. In 2023 he sang Germont in La Traviata at the St Endellion Festival and recorded the role for a new film by Opera Glassworks which was released on Sky Arts in January 2025. Future engagements include Yeletsky / Pique Dame for Garsington Opera.


Recent and future concert engagements include performances with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, London Symphony Orchestra, Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, BBC National Orchestra of Wales, BBC Philharmonic, BBC Symphony, Royal Scottish National Orchestra, the Hallé, Britten Sinfonia, City of London Sinfonia, Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Gabrieli Consort, The Sixteen, The King's Consort, Le Concert Spirituel, Ensemble Orchestral de Paris, Berlin Philharmonic, RIAS Kammerchor, Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin, Netherlands Radio Philharmonic, St Paul Chamber Orchestra, Bergen Philharmonic Orchestra, Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia, Bayerische Rundfunk, San Francisco Symphony, Music of the Baroque Chicago, New York Philharmonic, Utah Symphony, Cincinnati Symphony, Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra, Sao Paulo Symphony, Bach Collegium Japan, and Singapore Symphony. He is a regular performer at the BBC Proms, featuring as the soloist in the Last Night in 2014, and most recently appearing in the St Matthew Passion in 2021, and the world premiere of Matthew Kaner's 'Pearl' in 2022. Other recent engagements included tours of Japan with the BBC SO, of Europe with the RIAS Kammerchor, and of North America with Bach Collegium Japan.

He is an accomplished recital artist who can be heard regularly at venues and festivals including Wigmore Hall, Kings Place, LSO St Luke's, the Perth Concert Hall, Ludlow Song Festival, Oxford Lieder Festival, Howard Assembly Room in Leeds, Bath International Festival, Three Choirs Festival, Aldeburgh Festival, Edinburgh International Festival, the Concertgebouw and the Musikverein. In 2019 he performed all three Schubert cycles at Wigmore Hall. His recital programmes often feature repertoire by British composers, including many new works. He appears frequently on BBC Radio 3 and Radio 4 as both performer and presenter.

His numerous recordings include Vaughan Williams, Berkeley and Britten operas for Chandos, and an extensive repertoire of English song with pianist lain Burnside for Naxos. Other recent recordings include an award-winning disc of French song with Roger Vignoles for Champs Hill Records, the three Schubert Cycles with lain Burnside for Chandos, and recordings of Stanford and Somervell with Susie Allan for Somm. He has also recorded Schubert's Winter Journey in a new translation by Jeremy Samms with Christopher Glynn for Signum. He sang Captain Balstrode / Peter Grimes with the Bergen Philharmonic Orchestra for Chandos (Gramophone Recording of the Year 2021). He has also recorded his own arrangement of Butterworth's A Shropshire Lad and other English repertoire with the Hallé and Sir Mark Elder, also for Chandos.

He is an established composer and has recently taken up the role of Composer in Association of the BBC Singers. Commissions include a major work, World without End, for the RIAS Kammerchor and BBC Singers, as well as a commission to celebrate the centenary of the RAF. He was Artistic Director of Leeds Lieder + in April 2016 and Artist in Residence with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra 2020-2022. Currently he is 'singer-in-residence' for Music in the Round in Sheffield, presenting concerts and leading on dynamic and innovative learning and participation projects that introduce amateur singers, young and old, to performing classical song repertoire. In 2023 he was Artistic Director of the St Endellion Summer Festival, and Artist in Residence at the Aldeburgh Festival.

In 2016 he won the Royal Philharmonic Society's Singer of the Year award, and in June 2017 was awarded an OBE for services to music. He also performed at the Coronation of King Charles III in 2023.

lain Burnside

Thanks to prolific careers both as pianist and award-winning broadcaster, lain is one of the UK's best-known musicians.

lain has worked with a broad roster of

international singers: Dame Margaret Price, Rosa Feola, Ailish Tynan, Joyce DiDonato, Laurence Brownlee, Roderick Williams, and Bryn Terfel, among many others. He has recorded more than 60 CDs, often created around neglected composers, where his curatorial skills are displayed to the full. He is a great champion of young singers, playing a crucial role in introducing them to a wider audience. Recent highlights include a Rachmaninov Song Series at Wigmore Hall with outstanding Slavic singers, following his acclaimed Delphian recordings of Rachmaninov and Medtner. Other Delphian collaborations range from Schubert Lieder to songs from each of Scotland, England, Wales, and Ireland.

Innovative programme planning has led lain to expand his concert work into a hybrid form of music theatre, creating staged work around Brahms (*Shining Armour*), Wagner (*The View from the Villa*) and Gurney (*A Soldier and a Maker*). He has broadcast extensively on both

radio and TV, notably as host of BBC R3's acclaimed Voices series.

In addition to a long association with London's Guildhall School, Iain is Visiting International Artist at the Royal Irish Academy of Music, Dublin. Competitions where he has served as a jury member include Concours Reine Elisabeth in Brussels, Busoni and Honens piano competitions and Wigmore Hall International Song Competition. He is Artistic Director of the Ludlow English Song Weekend and Artistic Consultant to Grange Park Opera, Surrey.



Libby Larsen

Libby Larsen (b. 1950, Wilmington, Delaware) is one of America's most performed living composers. Elected to the

American Academy of Arts and Letters (2024), she has composed over 500 works including orchestra, opera, vocal and chamber music, symphonic winds, and band. Her work is widely recorded. An advocate for the music and musicians of our time, in 1973 Larsen co-founded the Minnesota Composers Forum, now the American Composer's Forum. Grammy Award winner and former holder of the Papamarkou Chair at John W. Kluge Center of the Library of Congress, Larsen has also held residencies with the Minnesota Orchestra, the Charlotte Symphony, and the Colorado Symphony. From 2014-2020 as, Artistic Director of the John Duffy Institute for New Opera, she guided a faculty of practicing professional artists in nurturing and production of new opera by American Composers. Larsen's 2017 biography, Libby Larsen: Composing an American Life, Denise Von Glahn, author, is available from the University Illinois Press. Thank you to the generous donors who supported tonight's performance in honor of Libby Larsen's 75th Birthday.


